- ▶ Shop with reputable retailers. Bookmark your favorite shopping site to quickly get to it. **Don't type the retailers name into your browser** bar because you could make a typo that sends you to a fake site that looks like the real one.
- ▶ **Don't shop while on public WiFi.** Since online shopping requires submitting your name, address, and credit card number, someone sitting next to you at the coffee shop could be a hacker spying on your online activity.



Check site security before you buy. The URL in the browser bar should start with "https" rather than "http." Look for a lock icon in the site's address bar to verify they're using SSL encryption, which will mask the data you share like passwords and financial information.
